


Class I Freight Railroad Highlights

Safety: Most Class I's improve their safety record.

- For third straight year (2004-2006), BNSF is the only Class I to achieve all six FRA safety performance goals.
- In 2006, UP performed well, but failed to meet the FRA goals for track- and signal-related train accidents.
- KCS continued its poor record from prior years, ranking worst of all Class I's on five of six safety performance measures.
- CSX, NS, CN, and KCS all failed to meet FRA's 2006 grade-crossing goal. Again, KCS had by far the worst record for grade-crossing incidents.

Financial: A strong showing for most Class I's in 2005 and 2nd Qtr 2006.

- Operating revenues up sharply 14.6% in 2Q '06 vs. 2Q '05.
- Heavy demand, coal, and rising fuel charges drive strong 20 '06 earnings.
 - → BNSF quarterly operating income up 23% over prior year.
 - → CSX up 39%.
 - → KCS up 40%.
 - → UP up 49%.
- Traffic continues to reflect a strong economy, with freight train-miles rising almost 10% from 2001 through 2005.

Operational: Rail shipments near capacity. Demand is high.

- Rail employment increases 3% in '05 (vs. '04).
- Miles-of-road operated down 0.7% in '05 (vs. '04).
- Train-miles up 2.4% in '05 (vs. '04).
- Revenue ton-miles up almost 6% in 2Q '06 (vs. 2Q '05).
- Coal, chemicals, and motor vehicles again dominate commodities hauled.
