8 Public Involvement and Agency Coordination

1Agency and public involvement is an integral part of the National Environmental Policy Act2(NEPA) process. Accordingly, the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) provided numerous3opportunities for open, collaborative, and meaningful participation for the Washington Union4Station (WUS) Expansion Project (Project). This chapter summarizes the public and agency5involvement activities for the Project's NEPA and Section 106 of the National Historic6Preservation Act (NHPA) reviews.

8.1 Scoping

Scoping is an essential part of NEPA. The scoping process is an open way to determine the
 range of alternatives and resources analyzed in an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). It
 provides agencies and the public an early opportunity to comment on the Project.

10FRA published a Notice of Intent (NOI) to prepare an EIS for the Project in the Federal11Register on November 4, 2015 (Appendix A1, Notice of Intent to Prepare an Environmental12Impact Statement). The NOI announced the beginning of the environmental review and13Scoping process for the Project. The NOI also provided the draft Purpose and Need for the14Project; information about the Scoping process; methods to comment on the Project; and15the public Project website address. The Scoping process ended on January 4, 2016.

8.1.1 Agency Scoping

- 16On August 27, 2015, FRA convened an agency pre-scoping meeting to share and gather17information on agency coordination for the Project. At the Pre-scoping Meeting, FRA18provided background information on the Project, described the Project and FRA's19responsibilities, and solicited comments on the future level of participation by each agency.

- At the Agency Scoping meeting, FRA presented a Project overview, background information, and an outline of next steps in the NEPA process. FRA encouraged agency representatives to ask questions and participate in the discussion throughout the meeting. FRA asked agency representatives to submit written comments by January 4, 2016.
- Appendix A2, Washington Union Station Expansion Project Scoping Report provides materials
 from the Agency Scoping Meeting, including the presentation. Table 8-1 summarizes agency
 concerns and requests raised during the Agency Scoping Meeting and in written comments.
 Appendix D of the Scoping Report (Appendix A2) provides a complete list of the agency
 comments. FRA received Scoping comment letters from the following agencies: NPS, GPO,
 DDOT, NCPC, DCBAC, DCOP, and WMATA.

8.1.2 Public Scoping

- FRA held a Public Scoping Meeting (Public Meeting #1) from 4:00 PM to 8:00 PM on
 December 7, 2015, in the President's Room at WUS. FRA's Project Website
 (www.wusstationexpansion.com) and local newspapers (*The Hill Rag, Washington Express, Washington City Paper, and Washington Informer*) advertised the meeting (see Appendix A2,
 Washington Union Station Expansion Project Scoping Report).
- One hundred and eighty-five members of the public, representatives from local 83 governments, and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) participated in the Public Scoping 84 meeting. FRA made a brief presentation about the Project at 4:30 PM and at 7:00 PM. 85 Representatives of FRA, National Railroad Passenger Corporation (Amtrak), and Union Station 86 Redevelopment Corporation (USRC) teams were available to discuss concerns or questions 87 with the attendees. Information provided at the meeting included the Project's draft Purpose 88 and Need statement, current WUS functions, and environmental considerations for the Draft 89 Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). Materials shared at the meeting included Project 90 Area map displays, and handouts. 91




Figure 8-1. Number of Agency and Public Scoping Comments by Topic

- FRA invited the public to submit comments in person at the Scoping meeting, by mail to FRA, 92 by email through the Project website (info@wusstationexpansion.com), or by using a 93 comment form on the Project website. FRA received 99 comment forms, letters, and post-it 94 note comments at the Scoping meeting. FRA also received 64 public comment letters and 95 emails during the Scoping Period (comments are listed in Appendix D of Appendix A2, 96 Washington Union Station Project Scoping Report). The majority of comments received were 97 related to WUS design, particularly multimodal and pedestrian access and connectivity 98 (Figure 8-1). FRA considered all public Scoping comments received in preparing the DEIS. A 99 summary of public comments received is in Table 8-2. 100

8.2 Agency Coordination During Preparation of the DEIS

103Agencies can participate in the Project's NEPA process as a Cooperating Agency or as an104Interested Agency. Agencies were engaged during specific points of the Project to inform105decision making throughout the NEPA process. Agency coordination included identification106and engagement of agencies to maintain open communications, as well as informing107permitting and resource agencies about the NEPA process, and applicable regulations to the108Project. FRA considered all agency comments received in preparing the DEIS.

8.2.1 Cooperating Agencies

Cooperating Agencies have particular expertise and jurisdiction with respect to any 109 environmental issue, including agencies for which the Project would require NEPA action. In 110 agreement with FRA through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), these agencies have 111 specific roles and responsibilities regarding the NEPA process and review pre-publication 112 drafts of the DEIS and Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS). The Cooperating 113 Agencies provided input for defining the Project's Purpose and Need, the range of reasonable 114 alternatives to be considered, and the methodologies and level of detail required in the 115 Alternatives Analysis. They also identified issues that could substantially delay or prevent 116 obtaining needed permits and approvals, participated in coordination meetings, and 117 prepared mitigation recommendations. The Cooperating Agencies for the Project include 118 FTA, NPS, DDOT, and NCPC. Information on these Cooperating Agencies is provided in 119 Section 1.8, Introduction, Cooperating Agencies. FRA convened monthly meetings with DDOT 120 to coordinate on the Project. These meetings included representatives of the H Street Bridge 121 and DC Streetcar projects. FRA has and will continue to convene Cooperating Agency 122 meetings throughout the NEPA process. Table 8-3 summarizes Cooperating Agency meetings 123 held to date. 124

- Flyers, fact sheets, brochures, press releases, electronic newsletters, e-blast notifications, 176 paid advertisements, and website updates complemented public meetings. 177

8.3.1.1 Public Meeting #2, Public Forum

187FRA hosted an informational forum on Wednesday, March 30, 2016, from 4:00 PM to1888:00 PM to inform the public about the Project. The forum was held in WUS's Presidential189Room in an open house format to encourage discussion between the public and Project190Team (FRA, USRC, and Amtrak). Topics of discussion included the Project design concepts,191the historic station, concourse, tracks and platforms, bus terminal, taxi, parking, and bicycle192and pedestrian access. The forum was attended by 224 members of the public, including193community representatives, interested stakeholders, and residents.

8.3.1.2 Public Meeting #3, Preliminary Project Concepts and Screening

- 194FRA hosted the Project's third public meeting and open house on October 19, 2016 from1954:00 PM to 8:00 PM in WUS's Presidential Room. The Project Team was available for196discussion of the Project and to answer questions. Formal presentations were given at1974:30 PM and 6:30 PM.
- 198This meeting was an opportunity for the public to review and provide feedback on the199preliminary Project concepts and screening. The preliminary concepts illustrated potential200Project elements that will shape the layout of the Project. The program elements include201realigned and improved tracks and platforms; new public concourses; a train hall; and new

202 203 parking, bus, and taxi facilities. FRA sought public comments to help determine the Project concepts that should advance for further study in the DEIS.

8.3.1.3 Public Meeting #4, Presentation of Alternatives

- FRA hosted the WUS Expansion Project's fourth Public Meeting and open house on
 March 22, 2018 from 4:00 PM to 8:00 PM in WUS's Presidential Room. The Project Team was
 available for discussion of the Project and to answer questions. Formal presentations were
 given at 4:30 PM and 6:30 PM.
- 208At this meeting, FRA presented the DEIS Alternatives and requested public input to help209inform the evaluation of Alternatives in the DEIS. FRA also shared information on the concept210screening and refinement process, preliminary alternatives, and alternatives refinement211process.

8.3.1.4 Public Hearing, Draft Environmental Impact Statement

FRA will be hosting a Public Hearing on July 14, 2020, approximately 30 days after the release of the DEIS and during the 45-day DEIS public review period. At the Public Hearing, the public will be given the opportunity to submit verbal comments on the DEIS.¹

8.5 **Public Review of the DEIS**

8.5.1 **Public Review and Comment Period**

8.5.1.1 Availability of the DEIS

In accordance with NEPA and FRA's Procedures for Considering Environmental Impacts, the 272 DEIS is open for comment from agencies and the public. FRA has made the DEIS available on 273 the Project website. FRA filed the DEIS with the EPA and the EPA will publish a Notice of 274 Availability (NOA) of the DEIS in the Federal Register on June 12, 2020. The public comment 275 period will remain open for 45 days after publication of the NOA. Agencies and the public 276 have been notified of the DEIS availability and comment period. They have been invited to 277 the Public Hearing scheduled for July 14, 2020 (see Section 8.5.2, Public Hearing on the DEIS, 278 below). 279

Notifications were made available through the *Federal Register*, emails to the Project mailing
 list, updates to the Project's website, advertisements in the *Washington Post*, *Hill Rag*,
 Washington Informer, *El Tiempo*, and *Washington City Paper*; and letters to agencies, elected

8.5.2 Public Hearing on the DEIS

- Public hearings are held at least 30 days after the release of the DEIS to receive oral 308 testimony from the public, elected officials, and agency representatives. Due to the ongoing 309 coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) public health emergency and consistent with the 310 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's guidance regarding large events and mass 311 gatherings, FRA will conduct a virtual public hearing for the Washington Union Station 312 Expansion Project DEIS. FRA will also hold other Project meetings virtually, including Section 313 106 Consulting Party meetings, and encourages submission of comments on the DEIS and 314 other documents electronically. 315
- The virtual public hearing is scheduled for July 14, 2020. There will be two sessions: 11:00 AM to 1:00 PM and 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM. The virtual public hearing can be accessed by dialing (866) 478-3399.

8.5.3 Final Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision

Pursuant to the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act of 2015 (FAST Act), FRA plans to 319 issue a single document consisting of the FEIS, Final Section 4(f) Evaluation, and Record of 320 Decision (ROD). After completion of the 45-day public comment period for the DEIS, FRA will 321 respond to all substantive comments received from the public and government agencies. 322 FRA's responses will be documented in the FEIS, which will address corrections and revisions, 323 as appropriate. FRA plans to publish a combined document that considers comments from 324 the comment period unless statutory criteria or practicability considerations preclude issuing 325 a combined document.² The ROD will identify the alternative selected for implementation, 326 explain the rationale for this selection, and list mitigation measures and environmental 327 commitments. 328
