

Update on FRA's National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Procedures

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Existing FRA NEPA Procedures

- Procedures for considering environmental impacts, includes Section 4(f)
- Last revised in 1999
- Published in Federal Register
- Available on FRA Website

Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act

- Signed December 4, 2015
- First long-term Federal transportation bill in more than 10 years
- Reforms certain elements of FRA's environmental and historic preservation review processes to help accelerate the delivery of rail projects

FAST Act Env. Reforms

- Application of project development procedures in 23 US.C. 139 to railroad projects (Sec. 11503)
- Requires survey of FRA's use of categorical exclusions and a rulemaking for new and existing categorical exclusions. (Sec. 11503)
- Historic rail and transit line exemption from the requirements of Section 4(f) (Sec. 11502)
- Establishment of a Section 106 exemption for railroads rights-of-way consistent with Interstate exemption (Sec. 11504)

23 U.S.C. 139 Process

- Existing FHWA and FTA process
- Mandatory for EISs, optional for EAs
- Focuses on full environmental review process
 - Includes the process for and completion of any environmental permit, approval or study required for a project under any other Federal law than NEPA.

Applicability

- Q&A issued on applicability in April 2016
- Section 139 procedures applies to railroad projects where:
 - The Notice of Intent to prepare EIS was published <u>after</u> December 4, 2015 and,
 - The Secretary approved the funding arrangement under title 49 of the United States Code <u>after</u> December 4, 2015

Roles and Responsibilities

- Lead Agency
- Participating Agencies
 - Agencies with interest in project
 - Lower bar than cooperating agency
 - If invited, Federal agencies must accept, unless they respond in writing

Process Management

- Project Initiation
- Coordination plan for coordinating with public and agencies
 - Must include a schedule
 - Establish plan no later than 90 days after the NOI or initiation of an EA
- Comment Deadlines
 - No more than 60 days for DEIS, 30 days for other comment periods

Purpose and Need

- Must provide "opportunity for involvement" by agencies and the public in defining P&N.
- Decision on P&N is made by lead agency.

Alternatives

Range of Alternatives:

 Similar to P&N – after providing "opportunity for involvement," lead agency makes the decision

Methodologies and Level of Detail:

 Lead agency decides, in collaboration with participating agencies

Preferred Alternative

 In certain circumstances, may be developed to higher level of detail than other alternatives

Other 139 Items

- Combined Final EIS/Record of Decision
- Issue Resolution Process
- State of Limitations
 - limitation on the claims period applicable to railroad projects is 2 years instead of 150 days for FHWA and FTA projects.

Categorical Exclusions

- FAST Act also required FRA to survey its use of NEPA categorical exclusions (CE) in railroad projects since 2005.
- On June 2, 2016, FRA published a notice in the Federal Register providing the public with a review of FRA's survey,
 - Requested comments on two new CEs, and suggestions for additional categories
 - Comment period ended on July 5, 2016.

FAST Act Implementation

- FRA has evaluated whether to join FHWA and FTA NEPA regulations in 23 CFR 771 which implements the Section 139 Process
- On June 9, 2016 FRA published a notice in the Federal Register requesting public comment on the application of part 771 to railroad projects
- FRA is working with FHWA and FTA on a joint rulemaking to join the regulations

Section 106

- Section 11504 directs DOT to provide the ACHP with a proposed exemption of railroad rights-ofway consistent with the existing exemption for the Interstate System
- Exemption not available until the ACHP has taken action
- FRA is leading implementation in coordination with FTA and FHWA
- Still working to develop proposal for submittal to ACHP

Section 4(f)

- Q&A issued March 2016
- Section 11502 exempts from Section 4(f) review
 - the use of railroad and rail transit lines, or elements thereof, that are in use or that were historically used for the transportation of goods or passengers
- Exemption does not apply to rail or transit stations
- Exemption does not apply to bridges or tunnels located on a rail line that been abandoned

Other FAST Act Items

Project Reporting

 Section 1304 requires Federal agencies participating in the environmental review or permitting process must provide information on status and progress of EISs and EAs on dashboard

Dedicated Staffing/Liaisons

 Section 1312 allows use of funds by eligible public entities to support Federal agencies,
 States agencies and Indian tribes participating in environmental processes
