

Port Bienville Railroad Agency Coordination & Public Involvement Plan

1. Purpose of Coordination Plan

This document provides a framework for the agency, stakeholder, and public involvement activities that will be undertaken during the Port Bienville Railroad Phase 1 Feasibility Study and Phase 2 Environmental Documentation. Coordination with interested parties was initiated during the Phase 1 Feasibility Study, and the information collected and parties reached during that phase will be carried forward in the process to the Phase 2 Environmental Documentation outreach activities. In anticipation of Phase 2, this Coordination Plan addresses requirements outlined in SAFETEA-LU Section 6002.

Section 6002 of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Act: a Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) requires that lead agencies establish a plan for coordinating public and agency participation and comment during the environmental review process. The purpose of this Coordination Plan is to define the process by which the Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT), in cooperation with the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) and the Hancock County Ports and Harbor Commission (HCPHC), will communicate information about the Port Bienville Railroad Feasibility Study and appropriate environmental documentation to the public, stakeholders, and agencies. The Plan also identifies how input will be solicited and considered.

The Coordination Plan integrates the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended (NEPA) requirements with other environmental review and consultation requirements in order to reduce delay in the environmental review process. This Plan has been prepared in collaboration with the MDOT and FRA for the completion of the Port Bienville Railroad Project through Hancock and Pearl River Counties in the State of Mississippi.

This Coordination Plan will:

- Describe the early coordination efforts conducted during Phase 1;
- Identify potential cooperating and participating agencies to be involved in agency coordination (Phase 2);
- Establish the timing and form of agency involvement in defining the project's purpose and need and study area, the range of alternatives to be investigated and methodologies, as well reviewing documents (Phase 2);
- Establish the timing and form of public involvement in defining the project's purpose and need and study area and the range of alternatives to be investigated, providing input on issues of concern and environmental features, and commenting on the findings presented (Phase 2); and
- Describe the communication methods that will be implemented to inform stakeholders and the public about the project (Phase 2).



The Coordination Plan will be updated periodically to reflect any changes to the project schedule and other items that typically require updating over the course of the project.

The Plan will be divided into two major sections, the involvement of agencies and the involvement of stakeholders and the general public. Each of these sections will identify the activities that will occur during Phase 2 of the Project. Agencies are defined as any local, state or federal government body that has authority in the decision making process. A stakeholder is defined as a group, organization or business that has a stake or major interest in the project. The public is defined as individuals that live or work within in the study area or may be impacted by the project.

2. Project Description

MDOT conducted a Feasibility Study and is pursuing the appropriate Environmental Documentation for the location of a new railroad line to connect the Port of Bienville Short Line Railroad, located at the Port Bienville Industrial Park (Port), Hancock County, with the Norfolk Southern Railroad in the vicinity of Nicholson in Pearl River County.

The ultimate goal is to identify feasible alternatives and to obtain an approved environmental document for the preferred location of this proposed rail line. This project includes two phases. The first phase, Phase 1, determined the feasibility of constructing and operating the rail line, reasonable alternative corridors for consideration, and the economic benefits including potential funding sources. This was through a Class of Action Recommendation Memo submitted to FRA. The second phase, Phase 2, will include the preparation of an environmental impact statement based on the known existing conditions to determine potential human and natural environment impacts of the project.

There are three guiding principles for this Project:

- First, that any plan to locate the railroad must provide positive benefits for the Port, the Railroads, and the counties involved.
- Secondly, the railroad location corridor must be compatible with the county's natural and human environment.
- Finally, the MDOT anticipates a high degree of community and stakeholder involvement and participation throughout the process. The MDOT and the CDM Smith Team will be proactively engaged to ensure effective stakeholder involvement during the course of this study.

2.1 Study Area




Figure 1. Project Study Area

The Project Study Area, in general, encompasses a portion of Hancock and Pearl River Counties. The project study area is generally bounded by Nicholson to the north, Port Bienville Industrial Park to the south, the Pearl River to the west, and Stennis International Airport and Kiln to the east, representing a study area of approximately 180 sq. mi. The proposed railway corridor is expected not to exceed a length of 30 mi. A map of the project study area is provided in **Figure 1**.

3. Agency Involvement (Phase 2)

3.1 Agency Roles and Responsibilities

FRA will be the lead federal agency for this project. As lead federal agency in the Section 6002 process, FRA is responsible for making certain decisions specified in Section 6002. In addition, FRA has an overall responsibility for facilitating the expeditious completion of the environmental review process, reviewing and accepting the environmental document, and ensuring MDOT complies with all requirements. MDOT, in cooperation with HCPHC as project sponsor, will act as Joint Lead Agency for this project.

As outlined in the SAFETEA-LU Section 6002 Environmental Review Process Checklist and in cooperation with FRA, this Plan is intended to define the process by which FRA shall communicate information about the project to the lead, cooperating, participating and other agencies. The plan will identify early coordination efforts, identify cooperating and participating agencies, and establish the timing and form for agency involvement in defining the project's purpose and need, as well as the alternatives to be investigated. The following provides a description of agency involvement.

In addition to FRA, the study team for this project consists of MDOT, HCPHC, FHWA, and the consultant team of CDM Smith and HDR. For more information about the study team coordination, see Section 7.

Cooperating Agencies

Cooperating Agencies are any federal agency other than the lead agency that has discretionary authority over the proposed action, jurisdiction by law, or special expertise with respect to the environmental impacts expected to result from the proposed project. Federal agencies with jurisdiction by law (with permitting or land transfer authority) are required to be invited to be Cooperating Agencies for an EIS.

Invitations to be a cooperating agency will be sent following the scoping meeting. If at any point new information reveals the need to request another agency to serve as a Cooperating Agency, FRA will issue that federal agency an invitation. MDOT will issue requests to non-federal agencies. A list of potential cooperating agencies is provided in Appendix A (*Note: Appendix A is a work-in-progress and will be finalized as the project evolves*).

Participating Agencies (coordination through MDOT)

Participating agencies are those that may have an interest in the project and is afforded an opportunity for involvement in the development of the proposed project. Participating agencies may also provide access to information integral to understanding and assessing the potential impacts and benefits of the project.

MDOT will formally invite participating agencies to participate in the environmental review of the project. Invitations to be a participating agency will be sent at the beginning of Phase 2. A list of proposed participating agencies is provided in Appendix A.

3.2 Scoping

At the beginning of Phase 2, an invitation to an agency scoping meeting will be sent to federal agencies with jurisdiction by law or special expertise and/or federal, state, tribal, regional, and local government agencies with an interest in the proposal or study area. The letters will include a Project Summary, Project Location Map, and background information from Phase 1 of the project, including the Feasibility Study.

The format of the agency scoping meeting will be a general meeting with presentation of project information. The purpose of the meeting will be to discuss the project scope, needs and objectives; review



the Phase 1 Feasibility Study, including the corridors that were identified; gather pertinent information and identify issues and concerns that should be addressed in the EIS; discuss agency roles and responsibilities discuss the next steps in the EIS process. *The scoping meeting was held on <u>August 19, 2015</u>.*

A separate meeting with the American Indian Tribal representatives will be held if determined to be necessary.

3.3 Agency Coordination Meetings

In addition to scoping, two additional agency coordination meetings will be held during the development of the project at key project milestones. These meetings will provide opportunities provide agencies with project updates and allow agencies to provide input on these coordination points.

3.3.1 Coordination Points

Cooperating and participating agencies have legal and general governmental obligations to work cooperatively to improve the environmental review process.

The intent of coordination points is to set a deadline for agency input in order to move the project study forward. These coordination points do not require concurrence or total agreement between agencies. If there is not concurrence, the lead and cooperating agencies will take information into account when project decisions are being made.

The cooperating and participating agencies identified in Appendix A will at a minimum be participating at the following four coordination points in the environmental review process during Phase 2:

- Scoping Meeting;
- Agency Coordination Meeting #1;
- Review of the environmental document; and
- Agency Coordination Meeting #2.

The process for coordination associated with each of the major milestones (coordination points) for this project are listed in **Table 1** and **Table 2** below.

4. Additional Coordination Activities

4.1 Section 106 Consulting Party Coordination

Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) requires the FRA and MDOT, in consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officers, to identify potential consulting parties and to invite them to participate in the Section 106 process.

FRA may use its procedures for public involvement under NEPA to satisfy the NHPA Section 106 requirements for public involvement as well, providing they offer adequate opportunities for public involvement. The NHPA requires the federal agency or its designee to seek the participation and consider the opinions on interested and appropriate parties throughout the Section 106 process including the identification and evaluation of cultural resources potentially affected by the project, the evaluation of project effects to historic properties, and the development of appropriate mitigation plans as needed. This involvement is referred to as consultation. MDOT shall consider the nature of the project and the kinds of historic properties potentially affected to identify the appropriate individuals, organizations, and entities with whom FRA will consult. Because MDOT considers Section 106 requirements early in the NEPA process, compliance with both statues will be coordinated throughout the project.

The project team will contact the Mississippi SHPO during the early phase of the project development process for any guidance or information to avoid any known archeological sites in the study area. A completed Request for Cultural Resources Assessment form will be submitted to the Mississippi SHPO at the Historic Preservation Division of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History. Mississippi SHPO has 30 days to review the project.

4.2 Tribal Consultation

FRA will be responsible for all coordination with all federally recognized Native American Tribes. As the lead federal agency, FRA initiated government-to-government consultation by letter with the federally recognized Native American tribes in Mississippi listed below:

- Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians
- Chickasaw Nation
- Jena Band of Choctaw
- Tunica-Biloxi Indians of Louisiana, Inc.
- Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma
- Quapaw Tribe of Oklahoma
- Alabama-Coushatta Tribe of Texas
- Muscogee Creek Nation

Tribal consultation will occur at the four coordination points identified in Section 3.3.1. FRA will be responsible for coordination with all the federally recognized Native American Tribes for this project.



5. Public Involvement Activities

The public will be provided opportunities to provide specific input on the purpose and need, the EIS, and the preferred alternative. A project specific plan for public input has been developed below which outlines the opportunities to be provided to the public to be involved in the project development process and describes strategies for encouraging public input, as required by NEPA.

5.1 Key Messages

There are several key messages that will be emphasized and communicated to stakeholders and the public throughout the study. These messages are intended to support the goals of the Public Involvement Plan:

- The study is an objective process to help determine what actions, if any, are needed to best serve the rail transportation needs of Port Bienville and the area.
- Before a project can be constructed, the FRA requires the completion of an environmental study.
- The feasibility study was completed in February 2013. The environmental study is expected to be complete in the fall of 2017.
- Funding sources for construction have yet to be identified.
- MDOT and FRA encourage the public's participation and will actively seek out and engage all who may be affected.
- The public has a voice in the decision-making process and MDOT will listen to and consider all input.

5.2 Public Scoping Meeting

A formal public scoping meeting will be held early on in Phase 2 to inform the public about the environmental study, identify any issues and concerns that should be addressed in the EIS, and solicit input on the draft project purpose and need.

5.3 Public Meetings

Up to two public meetings will be conducted during Phase 2. A second public meeting will be held to inform the public about study milestones and achievements and provide an opportunity to comment on the range of reasonable alternatives to be evaluated in the EIS.

The public meetings will be an open house format to allow attendees to review exhibits, discuss issues with project personnel one-on-one, and to provide written and oral comments. Short presentations at the public meetings may be provided by the project team.

Notices will be sent to public officials, elected officials, property owners, and other key stakeholders giving notification of each meeting/hearing. FRA will also notify members of the public who have requested to be notified of any public involvement activities through.

MDOT will publish print advertisements and notices in the local media to reach as broad a spectrum of the community in the study area as possible. The following is a list of local newspapers that will be used to disseminate information to the public: *The Sun Herald* (Biloxi); *The Sea Coast Echo* (Bay Saint Louis) and *The Picayune Item* (Picayune). Each ad with consist of a quarter-page ad.

Meeting notices and advertisements will also be published on the <u>www.gomdot.com</u> website.





5.4 Public Hearing

Upon issuance of the Draft EIS, a public hearing will be held to receive comments the project and the document. The public hearing will be an open-house format to allow attendees to review exhibits, discuss issues with project personnel one-on-one, and to provide written and oral comments. The open house portion of the hearing will be followed by a formal presentation with the opportunity for the public to make oral comments. A court reporter will be available at the hearing to transcribe comments that individuals may want to give orally. The study team will prepare an official transcript of the public hearing.

Notices will be sent to public officials, elected officials, property owners, and other key stakeholders giving notification of each meeting/hearing. Print advertisements and notices will also be published in the local media to reach as broad a spectrum of the community in the study area as possible.

5.5 Key Stakeholder Meetings

The Project Team will be available to conduct briefings, interviews, and/or small group meetings with local officials, key community leaders, community/civic groups, business groups, or other interested parties or organizations. These activities will also be used as opportunities to disseminate information about the project, solicit public input on the study issues and corridor needs, answer questions, and present findings.

The Project Team will work with local officials, schools, churches, and various other entities to facilitate involvement from residents and other stakeholders in the project area in settings that are accessible and comfortable.

During Phase 2, key stakeholders will continue to be engaged to provide feedback and comments that will be used during major coordination and decision making milestones.

A list of key stakeholders and full contact information is provided in Appendix A.

6. Communications Protocol

6.1 Media Relations

MDOT will handle all contact with the media during the project. During Phase 2, public involvement will be coordinated through Sedrick Durr, who is responsible for outreach within MDOT's Environmental Division. Project updates may be provided to the media at major project milestones. Notices of public meetings and hearings will be advertised in local media outlets. Advertisements must be published in the newspaper at least 14 days prior to any public meeting.

FRA Public Affairs will speak on behalf of FRA on project related issues.

6.2 Project Factsheets

Project fact sheets will be developed, during Phase 2, to be distributed during outreach efforts and public meetings. The fact sheets will be published both in print and posted to MDOT's website for distribution in the study area.

6.3 Project Website Content

MDOT's website, <u>www.gomdot.com</u>, will be updated with project information, contact information, purpose and need of the project, study area maps, public meeting announcements, and other project information as needed. Sensitive data that is protected by federal and state regulations will not be accessible. FRA will maintain a website for the EIS. It will be updated by FRA periodically and will serve as a repository for the



Notice of Intent, Draft EIS, Final EIS, and Record of Decision (ROD). FRA will also publicize public meetings and provide general project information on the website.

6.4 Project Database

A project database and mailing list of interested parties was developed at the initiation of the feasibility study and it will be maintained throughout the project. It will be designed to allow for targeted mailings and updating information, if necessary. This database will be designed to allow for innovative means for communicating with the public, and allowing for citizens to decide to receive project information electronically or by paper mail. The database is located in Appendix A. It is expected that this will be a dynamic database and be updated regularly as additional Stakeholders are identified.

7. Study Team Coordination

The study team consists of MDOT, HCPHC, FRA, FHWA, and the consultant team of CDM Smith and HDR. Through the development of the Phase 2 and the EIS, the study team will conduct status meetings via conference calls every three weeks.

In addition, the study team will meet at key milestones during project development, including: designation of reasonable/build alternatives to be evaluated in the DEIS, review of the Administrative DEIS, and selection of a preferred alternative. These meetings may be conducted via conference call, webinar or in person.

S1 — Critically imperiled in Mississippi because of extreme rarity (5 or fewer occurrences or very few remaining individuals or acres) or because of some factor(s) making it vulnerable to extirpation.

S2 — Imperiled in Mississippi because of rarity (6 to 20 occurrences or few remaining individuals or acres) or because of some factor(s) making it vulnerable to extirpation.

S3 - Rare or uncommon in Mississippi (on the order of 21 to 100 occurrences).

State and Federal Status

LE Endangered — A species which is in danger of extinction throughout all or a significant portion of its range.

LT Threatened — A species likely to become endangered in foreseeable future throughout all or a significant portion of its range.

Based on information provided, we conclude that if best management practices are properly implemented, monitored, and maintained (particularly measures to prevent, or at least, minimize negative impacts to water quality), the proposed project likely poses no threat to listed species or their habitats.

Recommendations:

We recommend that best management practices be properly implemented, monitored, and maintained for compliance, specifically measures that will prevent suspended silt and

contaminants from leaving the site in stormwater run-off as this may negatively affect water quality and habitat conditions within nearby streams and waterbodies.

In addition, portions of this project site are underlain by hydric soils and may be designated wetlands. If this project is approved, we ask that serious consideration be given to the cumulative impacts of wetland disturbance and elimination, and that appropriate, in-kind mitigation be provided.

Portions of this project site are located in suitable habitat for the federally threatened and state endangered Gopher Tortoise (*Gopherus polyphemus*). There are also documented occurrences of gopher tortoises near the proposed project site. **Therefore**, we recommend that gopher tortoise burrow surveys be conducted within twenty feet of the project site (particularly in welldrained sandy substrates). If tortoise burrows are found, the following individuals should be contacted: Kathy Shelton (kathys@mdwfp.state.ms.us) with the MS Dept. of Wildlife, Fisheries, & Parks and Matt Hinderliter (601-321-1132) of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

There are known Bald Eagle nesting territories in the vicinity of the proposed project. One of these is within the proposed project boundaries. While bald eagles are no longer considered threatened or endangered, they are protected under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act, and guidelines concerning their protection can be found here:

The state and federally endangered Piping Plover and state endangered Southeastern Snowy Plover have also been documented utilizing areas near the proposed project. The project as proposed should have no direct impact on these species; however, any modification or addition to the project that may adversely affect these areas could potentially impact the plovers. We ask that consideration be given to this should the project be modified.

Gulf Sturgeon are a federally threatened, state endangered fish species known to inhabit the vicinity. They are intimately tied to substrates by their diet which consists entirely of benthic organisms, and could potentially be impacted due to this relationship. Potential impacts need to be considered and further examined prior to the proposed renovation and expansion. If negative impacts such as reduction in prey availability are imminent for Gulf Sturgeon, mitigation efforts need to be made accordingly.

Please feel free to contact us if we can provide any additional information, resources, or assistance that will help minimize negative impacts to the species and/or ecological communities identified in this review. We are happy to work with you to ensure that our state's precious natural heritage is conserved and preserved for future Mississippians.

The Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) has reviewed the information in your electronic mail dated November 12, 2014, regarding the Port of Bienville Project (Project No. 105494 FRA-0023-00(003)) in Hancock and Pearl River counties, Mississippi. Our comments are submitted in accordance with the Endangered Species Act (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.).

According to your electronic mail, the information the Service is providing in this letter will be used to assess impacts of the proposed project on federally listed species. Included is a list of species that may occur within the entire project study area, not just in the areas identified in proposed alignment segments. The Service has interpreted the segments you sent as the proposed new alignment routes and alternative routes for the new and upgraded railroad; if this assumption is inaccurate, please submit further information that includes a key or a description of the information provided in your maps to our office.

Please include in future project assessments all aspects of construction including an evaluation of areas that will provide fill for the construction of the rail line. If fill for the project will be obtained from areas outside the location of the proposed project study area, then please contact our office with additional location and project information so that we may provide a revised species list.

The following federally listed species may occur in the project study area:

Louisiana Black Bear

The federally listed threatened Louisiana black bear (*Ursus americanus luteolus*) occurs primarily in bottomland hardwood and floodplain forests along the Mississippi River and the southern part of the state. Although the bear is capable of surviving under a range of habitat types, some necessary habitat requirements include hard mast, soft mast, escape cover, denning sites, forested corridors, and limited human access. Forest management practices, agricultural, Mr. Vincent 12 December 2014 Page 2

commercial and industrial development, and highways can cause adverse impacts to bear habitat by increasing human disturbance, fragmenting forests, and removing den trees.

Bald Eagle

Although the bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) was officially removed from the List of Endangered and Threatened Species as of August 8, 2007, it continues to be protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (BGEPA). Bald eagles nest in Mississippi from December through mid-May in mature trees (e.g., bald cypress, sycamore, willow, etc.) near fresh to intermediate marshes or open water. Nest sites typically include at least one perch with a clear view of the water or area where the eagles usually forage. Bald eagles are vulnerable to disturbance during courtship, nest building, egg laying, incubation, and brooding. The Service developed the National Bald Eagle Management (NBEM) Guidelines to provide landowners, land managers, and others with information and recommendations regarding how to minimize potential project impacts to bald eagles, particularly where such impacts may constitute "disturbance," which is prohibited by the BGEPA. Gulf Sturgeon

The threatened Gulf sturgeon (*Acipenser oxyrhynchus desotoi*) is found in the Pearl, Leaf, and Pascagoula Rivers. Gulf sturgeons are primitive, anadromous fish that annually migrate from the Gulf of Mexico into freshwater streams to spawn. Subadults and adults spend eight to nine months each year in rivers. Although Gulf sturgeon activity is not well documented, the species has been found in the upper reaches of the Pearl, Leaf, Strong, Bouie, and Chickasawhay Rivers as far north as the Jackson metropolitan area. Adult and subadult holding areas have been identified in the Pascagoula River. The decline of the Gulf sturgeon is primarily due to limited access to migration routes and historic spawning areas, habitat modification, and water quality degradation.

Gopher Tortoise

The threatened gopher tortoise (*Gopherus polyphemus*) occupies a wide range of upland habitat types. The general physical and biotic features thought to characterize suitable tortoise habitat are: presence of well-drained, sandy soils, which allow easy burrowing; an abundance of diverse herbaceous ground cover; and an open canopy and sparse shrub cover, which allows sunlight to reach the ground floor. The gopher tortoise digs burrows for shelter, and groups of tortoises dig burrows in the same location, forming a colony. Some of the major threats to the species are habitat degradation (often attributed to fire suppression) and habitat fragmentation (often attributed to urbanization and agricultural/silvicultural conversion), which can result in forage reduction, direct human impacts, and reproductive isolation.

Ringed Map Turtle

The threatened ringed map turtle (*Graptemys oculifera*) is found in the Pearl River. It prefers river stretches with moderate currents, abundant basking sites, and sand bars for nesting. Stream modification in the Pearl River, such as flood control and urban development, has significantly contributed to the decline of the species. Water quality degradation has also posed a serious problem for the turtle.

Inflated Heelsplitter

The threatened inflated heelsplitter mussel (*Potamilus inflatus*) is found in the lower Pearl River, Noxubee, and Tombigbee watersheds. It inhabits areas with moderate to swift currents, and prefers riffle or shoal areas with stable bottoms composed of sandy gravel or firm mud gravel and cobble. Work activities that increase sedimentation and water turbidity, or alter channel geometry or flow could have adverse impacts on this species.

Louisiana Quillwort

The endangered plant Louisiana quillwort (*Isoetes louisianensis*) is a nonflowering grass-like plant that lives in water or in very wet habitats. Mature plants are six to ten inches long, mostly evergreen, with spore-bearing structures below ground. Surveys need to be conducted during the appropriate field season when the plants are visible, typically November into May. Timing varies depending upon rainfall, as plants completely dieback and are not visible when the intermittent streams, which are habitat for this species, have dried-up. Threats include activities that increase stream sedimentation, reduce stream flow, and reduce the overstory canopy cover.

According to information in the feasibility study you sent to our office on November 25, 2014, the proposed project will include several stream crossings and will impact several hundred acres of wetlands. These areas may provide suitable habitat for the federally endangered Louisiana quillwort. Additionally, wetlands provide important habitat for many migratory birds which are protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C. 703-712).





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

Site card for this RR line segment states the site is undetermined due to its non-association with the mission of the Stennis Space Center. From information contained at MDAH, this RR line segment is actually associated with the Mississippi Army Ammunitions Plant –the only one of its kind built in the US after the Korean War. Despite the fact that the ammunitions plant is under 50 years of age, the ammunitions plant served a unique function in military history in the US –making it eligible under Criterion A. Information provided in the report has determined that the RR line was constructed to enable construction of the center before being also utilized in an unknown capacity to service the ammunitions plant. Since the line was built for other uses and then also utilized for the plant, MDAH concurs with an unknown determination.
